God Builds Faith

Well...thanks Gilbert for that song...and thanks Kelley for setting up today's story in our study "Days of Elijah"

- Today...like Kelley said...we are going to look at the story of this widow...and how God built her faith when she went through a time where God didn't make sense.
- And let me say we're going to look at her story in 4 steps ... 4 pieces of her story that we will walk through one at a time.
- And we'll see that these 4 steps form a sort of cycle...a sequence or progression that God often uses in our life when he wants to build our faith.

OK...so we'll see this in 4 steps, and kids...sorry...this is probably the least kid-friendly sermon in our Elijah series! It's got some kind of grown-up ideas.

- Now... it still relates to all of us no matter what age we are.
- But next week...we'll be back on more kid-friendly ground, when we talk about Elijah facing the prophets of Baal!

Let's Pray

- So we're going to look at this story in 4 steps ... and as we look at each of the steps in this story ... we'll talk about how it relates to us.
- So 4 steps ... and the first step in her story is this:
- 1. At First...God seems to make perfect sense (X2). To this woman...

I mean...if you were here last week...and you heard the story of Elijah and this woman...just think about where she is...as we come to today's story:

- You know, at the **beginning** of **last week's story**...she was a **Baal worshiper**.
 - o She worshipped this false god ... this storm god ... this idol named Baal.
 - She lived in a **town** that was the **very center** of **Baal worship**...
- And she worshiped Baal: When she meets Elijah—the prophet of the true
 God—she says "as surely as YOUR God lives (like 'he's your God, not my God) as sure as your God lives...I don't have anything to eat"

So this woman started out...as a Baal worshipper.

But then...in last week's story...something amazing thing happens: Elijah introduces her to the true God... And she takes a step of faith:

- Elijah says "give God the <u>first part</u> of the little bit you have left--take the first part of your little bit of flour... and the first part of your little bit of oil ... and give it to my God—the true God—and he will rescue you.
- He will **show you** he's the **true God** by **providing for you**.
- So this woman **does it**—she takes a step of faith—she **trusts** in this **God of Israel**...

And you know...it works! God provides... His promise is true!

- I mean...not only was there enough flour in her jar...and enough oil in her jug to make a meal for herself and her son and Elijah on that day...
 - o But there was **enough** for the **next** day...and the **next** day...and the **next**...
- And **not only** did God **provide** for her... and **continue to provide**...
- But God <u>promised</u>—he specifically said through his prophet Elijah—that he would provide food for this widow, and her son...and Elijah...until the day that the drought ended.

And listen... I'm sure for her, as she lived out that promise...everything made sense:

- She had found the **true God**... she had **done** what he **asked** and **taken** a step of **faith**...
- The **true God promised** to **provide** for **this woman** and her **son**... and she had found his **promise** to be **true**. **Everything made sense**.

And you know guys, like that widow...when we first turn to God... when we first stop trying to do life on our own...and place our trust in the true God... the God of the Bible...Life usually starts to make sense.

- It does. I mean... think about it: God made you with a purpose.
- He made you and me to **operate**—to **live our lives**—a **certain way**.
- He made the **world** to operate in a **certain way**... It's like **God** has just **woven** his **purposes**...his **wisdom**...his **character**...into this **world**
 - So that life is better when we tell the truth...life is better when we love our neighbor...life is better when we don't take things that don't belong to us...
 - o life is better when we **worship** the God who **made** our world.

We were **made** to **do these things**...so when we **do them**...**life** makes **sense**.

And that often happens when we first turn to God.

- How many **people** do I **know** ... that **come to Jesus** ... and you can just **see** the **joy** on their **face** when they **first invite God** into their **life**.
- Just like this **widow**...we find **God's promise** is **true**...and we find **joy** in **serving him**... and both **life** and **God**...just **make sense** in a **new way**.
- So at first...at the 1st step in our story...God seems to make perfect sense. <u>BUT...</u>
 Step 2: But there came a time...when God didn't make any sense.

There came a time when God didn't seem to make any sense...at all.

- Let me show you what I mean: *Look what the Bible tells us in 1 Kings 17:17...*
- This is **right after** God had **promised** to **provide** for this **woman** and her **son**:
- The **drought** is **still on**, but it's **OK**: God is **still providing**...when the **writer** tells us **this**:
- ¹⁷ Some time later the son of the woman who owned the house became ill. He grew worse and worse, and finally ...stopped breathing.

This woman's **son grew ill...** and he **died**.

• This verse tells us *he stopped breathing*: Later on both Elijah and the widow are going to say that he was dead. The widow's son died!

And you know...this wouldn't have made any sense to this widow.

- I mean God had just <u>rescued</u> her and her son from death...he had <u>provided</u>.
- And **not only that**... but God had **promised** to **keep providing** for **both** of them...until the **drought** was **over**... Suggesting that they were going to live through the drought!
- God had said that. And now *this* happened.

And think about it: it was bad enough that her son had died—right?

- But why would God give them hope...why make a promise...only to do this?
- I'm **sure** this woman was **completely confused**: *it reminds me of a statement I once heard somebody make about a ruler of a 3rd world country who started good...but then who had turned into an evil dictator*:
- *she said* "how could you **give us so much**... And then **take away more**?" *How could you show such kindness* ... *and such cruelty*? I'm **sure** that's how this **widow felt**. I'm **sure** at **this point**... God didn't make **any sense** to her.

And **you know guys**...I **have** to **say** something: if you **follow God long enough**... there will come a **time**...when he **doesn't seem** to **make sense**.

- There will come a **time** when his **promises don't seem to be true**...
- A time when you **struggle** to **believe** that God is **on your side** at all.
- God won't seem to make sense.

It **might** be a time when you **suffer injustice:** A time when you do the **right thing**... and you get in **trouble** for it. **It doesn't make sense**

It might be a **time** when God **withholds** the things that seem to be his "**normal**" **blessings from you.**

- Maybe you're a godly young man or godly young woman... And you can't find a godly husband or wife. No matter how hard you try.
- Maybe you're a godly couple that wants to have kids... And you can't.
- Maybe you're a **godly parent** that has a **wayward child**. You **honestly** tried your **best** to **raise them right**...you did it by the **numbers**. And it **doesn't seem** like it **paid off**.
- Whatever it is...God has withheld his "normal" blessings from you. The things that normally happen for obedient people don't happen for you.
- When you **experience** that...God doesn't **seem** to **make sense**.

Maybe you see bad people who seem to get away with it:

- Sometimes people cheat on tests... and they pass them anyway.
- Sometimes the **kid at school** that everyone **knows** is the **mean kid**... becomes the **teacher's pet.**
- Sometimes cheaters do seem to prosper. Sometimes they get rich.
- Maybe we see **injustice**...Maybe we **face disaster**... like the **widow did.**

Or maybe we just **serve God over and over**... to the **point of exhaustion**... and it just **doesn't seem** to **pay off.**

- Maybe it seems like the **reward** for your **faithful service**... Is to **always face another test** of your **faith**.
- And it **feels** like God is **ignoring** you... or **maybe** even like he's **against** you... and God just **doesn't seem to make sense**.

Let me just ask...Have you ever gone through that?

- I think maybe some of you are in **that kind of a time** right **now**.
- You're wondering what God is up to. He doesn't seem to make sense.

If that's **you**... can I just **tell you something**? Here's what you need to **know**:

- You're **not alone**. That isn't **new**. What this **widow** is going through...what **you're** going through...is **not new**.
- In fact—I kind of hate to say this, but it's standard operating procedure for God. It's something he does all throughout the Bible.
- Think about it: if you know the stories this happens again and again:
 - o **Joseph** obeyed God and he ended up in **prison**...
 - o Israel obeyed God and departed from Egypt... and he took them straight to the Red Sea.
 - o **Daniel** obeyed God...And ended up in a **den of lions**.
 - o Jesus obeyed God perfectly... and God led him to the cross.

In each of these moments and many many more in the Bible ... God didn't seem to make sense

• Listen...(1) at first... God seemed to make perfect sense. (2) But there came a time...when God didn't make any sense at all. Now the 3rd step of this woman's story is this:

3. The woman wondered if God was against her, or if it was because of her sin (X2).

This woman doesn't know what's going on. But as she tries to make sense of the death of her son...she starts to wonder about some things. <u>Look at verse 18:</u>

18 She said to Elijah, "What do you have <u>against</u> me, man of God? Did you come to remind me of my <u>sin</u> and kill my son?"

She wonders 2 things: first... she wonders "could it be that God is just against me?"

- You know... There are different translations of the woman's 1st question:
 - o **GNB** renders it "why did you do this to me?"
 - o Message "why did you ever show up here in the first place?"
 - o NRSV "what have you against me?"
- These translations are **all slightly different**...but they all **amount** to the **same thing**: She's thinking "Maybe God is just out to get me."
- She's thinking "maybe I'd have been better off without this True God in my life after all"
- "Maybe he's **not** as **good** as I thought. Maybe he **doesn't love me** as much as I **thought** he did.

That's what she's thinking. And, let me ask...Can you see why the woman might think that? Can you see why she might think that God is out to get her?

• Sometimes we think that way when God doesn't make sense. We think he's out to get us, don't we?

"Or maybe"...she thinks... "this is <u>because of my sin</u>. Maybe it's because of things I've done in the past that are wrong."

- You know...we've all sinned.
 - We've all disobeyed our parents when we knew they were right.
 - We've all said and done things to our family or our friends that were hurtful.
 - o We've all been selfish when we should have been serving...
 - We've all had times when we <u>didn't speak the truth</u>...or when we <u>took something</u> that didn't belong to us.
- And we all **know** those things are **wrong**...but we **do them anyway**.

We sin...everybody sins. And you know what? Sometimes God judges sin.

- The reason that **Israel** was having this **famine**...this **drought**...in the **first place**... is because they had **sinned**. They had worshipped **Baal** and **disobeyed God**.
- So she's **thinking** "maybe God is **judging my sin**. Maybe he's judging **my former idolatry**."

The woman he's trying to figure out why this has happened to her. She's confused.

- All she **knows** is that she **followed this God of Israel**—she **thought God** was going to **watch over** her...and **Elijah**...and her **son**. And now her **son** is **dead**.
 - She doesn't know **what** to think.
 - o So she thinks **maybe** God is **against** her... or maybe he's **judging her sin**.

And you **know guys**...when God **doesn't make sense**...sometimes we think the **same thing**... *don't we?*

- We think "maybe I **didn't know God** as well as I **thought** I did... maybe his **promises** don't mean what I **thought** they meant."
 - o Maybe he is...kind of out to get me.
- Or we think "maybe I've sinned. Maybe I've been disobeying God... and he's letting me face hard times to teach me not to do that."
- Aren't those the places our minds go? It's confusing ... right?

In fact...I want you to notice something...even Elijah is confused by God.

- Even Elijah wonders why this has happened... and wonders if the lady might be right: Maybe God really is kind of out to get her...Look at vv.19-20...
- 19 "Give me your son," Elijah replied. He took him from her arms, carried him to the upper room where he was staying, and laid him on his bed. 20 Then he cried out to the LORD, "O LORD my God, have you brought tragedy also upon this widow I am staying with, by causing her son to die?"

Elijah says "Lord...this isn't just any widow. This is the widow I'm <u>staying</u> with. She put her faith in you. She obeyed you. She trusted you. She has provided for your prophet...

• And you promised to provide for her and her <u>son</u> every day. Are you really bringing this tragedy on her? Is this really what you're doing?" He's struggling!

And I want you to **notice something**: this is **Elijah** we're talking about: **Elijah**... one of the **greatest prophets** of the **entire Bible**.

- When you read the **story of Elijah**... he's **always confident** in **God**... he's **always** the **guy** with the **answers**!
 - o I mean... when he first meets the widow... and she says she has no food... Elijah tells her "make me a cake anyway... and God will provide" he has the answer!
 - o In **next week's story**...when Elijah faces **450 prophets of Baal**...he is **so sure** of **himself** that he offers them **every advantage**:
 - o He's like "we'll meet at <u>your place</u>...you can choose your sacrificial bull first ... we'll do fire from the sky because that's your god's thing...you can go first..."
 - He is so confident...he always has the answer.

He always has the answer! But not here.

- Here Elijah joins the widow in her confusion. He says "God...Is this really what you're doing? Is this really your purpose? Do you really want her to experience this pain and tragedy?"
- He admits that it doesn't make sense to him either

So...at first, (1) God seemed to make sense...(2) but there came a time...when he didn't make any sense at all. (3) The widow wondered whether God was against her... or whether he was judging her sin.

- In fact...even Elijah doesn't know what's going on...He doesn't know why this is happening: It doesn't make sense to him either.
- But here's the thing: Elijah does know...who to talk to about it.
- He does know...where to go. Elijah prays to God. He brings his honest confusion to God. Elijah prays.
- And as he prays...something happens. <u>Look at v.21</u>
- 21 Then he stretched himself out on the boy three times and cried to the LORD, "O LORD my God, let this boy's life return to him!" 22 The LORD heard Elijah's cry, and the boy's life returned to him, and he lived.

Somehow as Elijah prayed... As he brought this widow's need... and his honest confusion to God...God told Elijah what he wanted him to do.

- Elijah **stretched himself out** over the boy **3X**... And **3X** he **stated**, in the **simplest way possible**, the **request** God had **told him** to **make**...
 - o A request that no one in the whole Bible had ever made of God before.
- Elijah said "oh Lord my God, let this boy's life return to him"

Now... we don't know why God told Elijah to pray that way... but God did

- And as **Elijah did** what God **told him** to **do**... something **incredible happened**: the **boy returned to life!**
 - He started to breathe... and his eyes opened... And God raised that boy from the dead! It was incredible!
 - o Something no one had ever seen... or done... or heard of... ever before.

Now look at v.23...Elijah **responded** by doing what **any of us** would have **done**:

• ²³ Elijah picked up the child and carried him down from the room into the house. He gave him to his mother and said, "Look, your son is alive!"

And I'll bet that's not all Elijah did.

- I'll bet he... and the widow... in the boy did a little dance right there!
- They danced a **little jig**...Probably did the **Dougie**...a little bit of **Gangnam Style** right there! I **don't know**. I don't know what **dances** they **had**! But they **danced**!

• And I'll bet there was a **little bit of extra flour**...and **extra oil**...in the **jar** for **dinner** that night! *They celebrated! Her son was alive again!*

But there was **still the question**...of **why** God **allowed** this to **happen**.

• Why did God seem to do something that made no sense? Why did he allow this boy not just to get sick ... but to die? Why did God put this widow through this?

Well... In the last verse of our story... the woman realizes why.

- She had **thought** maybe it was because **God** was <u>against her</u>... she had **thought** maybe it was because God was **judging her sin...**
- But that wasn't it at all. Why did God allow this?

4. It was because God was building her faith (X2).

Look at what she says in v.24

• ²⁴ Then the woman said to Elijah, "Now I know that you are a man of God and that the word of the LORD from your mouth is the truth."

Think about that. She says "Now I know"...not before...but now.

- "NOW that my son got sick...NOW that he died...NOW that God didn't make any sense...NOW that he rescued me from all that. NOW I know."
- **Now** this widow has **full faith.** God **did this**...to **build her faith**.
 - And think with me for a minute ... about how God has grown this woman's faith.
 - Think about all she has come to know as a result of this tragedy:

1. She knows that Elijah is a true prophet of the true God.

- I mean...surely she thought that before-- I don't think you could completely dismiss a jar of flour and a jug of oil that never run out--so... she knew Elijah represented something real...
- But **now**... She knows **this** is the **real God**. *I mean this is* <u>THE</u> God. He's not just the God of **flour and oil**... He's the **real God**.
- She **knows** this... and she knows it in a **deeper**, **stronger** way then she did **before** her son got **sick**. *Now she won't be moved*.
- (1) She knows **Elijah** is a **true prophet** of the **true God**.

Secondly...She knows that the true God can overcome death (X2).

- You know... like we said... this widow started out as a Baal worshipper.
- And you know... much of what happens in Elijah's story is actually aimed at Baal.
 - You may **remember** from **last week Baal** was a *rain god... a storm god.*
 - o So how did God get Israel's attention when he wanted them to stop worshipping Baal? He brought a 3 year drought

• God is saying "listen... I'm the real God. I'm the God who can stop the rain and start the rain. Not Baal. I have power over rain."

So **Baal** was a **rain God**. But there's **one other thing** you need to **know** about **Baal**: Baal was **also engaged**... in a **constant struggle**... with **death**.

- In Canaanite mythology Baal was constantly at war with Mot... the God of death and the underworld. And Baal was never able to overcome him.
- Every year when the dry season came...the Baal worshippers believed that Baal had died and been dragged into the underworld...and that his sister had to rescue him and pull him back to the land of the living.

So **Baal** was **never able** to **overcome death**. And this **widow** would have **known that:** she would have **grown up hearing** those **stories**...

- So God gives her a special miracle...taylor-made for <u>her</u>...to build her faith.
- God lets her son die—something that at first seems very cruel—but it was the clearest, most incredible way ever... For God to assure her that he was the true God.
- He's saying "I'm the <u>real God</u>... The only God with authority over all things... even death... so you can put all your trust... in me.

You know, guys...we have a God who can overcome all things...even death.

- And our God doesn't call us to go anywhere he hasn't gone himself.
- God took this woman's son all the way not just through difficulty... but all the way to death. He went to extreme measures to assure her that he had power over death.
- But you know what? He was willing to do the same thing with his own Son.
- He took him **to death** and **through death**...a death that was **cruel** and **harsh**... and **didn't seem** to **make sense** at the **time**...
- So that we could rest assured that our God...the true God...has power over death

God grew this woman's faith... so that as we get to the end of the story... (1) she knew that Elijah was a true prophet of the true God... and (2) she knew that God could overcome death.

- And as we get to the end of the story... She knew one more thing:
- 3. She knew God made sense (X2).
- It's **not** just that God had **powers** she **didn't know about** before... It's that God really did make sense.
- His intentions really were as good as they had seemed... his promises really were as true as they seemed.

- He was **reliable**... he could be **trusted**. He **really was going** to **provide** for **her**...and for **her son** through the **whole drought**
- Because her son was going to live through the whole drought

Listen...here's the **point**: when she **got to the end** it **all made sense**.

- And Church...can I just give us all a word here? It's all going to make sense.
- When we get to the **end**...it's all going to **make sense**.
- When we get to the **end of our trial**...our **trials often make sense**.
- And when we get to the **end of all things**...it's **all** going to **make sense**.
- Every shred of <u>injustice</u> we've <u>experienced</u>... every time God seemed to <u>withhold normal blessings</u>... Every time the <u>wicked</u> seemed to <u>get away</u> with it... every time we <u>served faithfully</u>, and it <u>felt</u> like <u>no one noticed</u>... in the <u>end</u>, all of it... is going to <u>make perfect sense</u>. We'll see that it all has a <u>purpose</u>.

And I know that some of you are going through a hard time right now...

- and you're saying "I can't see it. I've looked and I've looked... I've prayed and I've prayed...and it just doesn't seem like God makes sense."
- Can I just **tell you**... you're not to the **end yet**. *Hang on till the end*.

You know ... there's a story told about a missionary named Henry C. Morrison:

- He had endured hardship ... and sacrificed ... and served in Africa for 40 years.
- He finally became ill and had to return home.
- He had poured out his life in faithful service to God. And he wondered as he sailed back, who might be there to greet him and welcome him back to America.

As his **ship** pulled into **NY Harbor**...he saw a **crowd of people** gathered...and some people **waving signs**...

• But his heart sank as realized not only that the crowd and signs weren't for him...but he realized that no one—not one single person—had come to welcome him back.

It **didn't make sense** to him. And he **later confessed** that he had a **moment** of **resentment**...where he prayed to **God** and **said**:

- "Lord...I've come back after 40 yrs. of hardship and faithful service, and not one person is here to welcome me home. How on earth does that make sense?"
- But he said then a still, small voice spoke to him and said "You're not home yet."

Listen: Eventually...in the end...God will make sense again.

• Maybe that will be at the **end of your trial**...maybe it will be when you **finally** reach home...but it's all going to make sense.

- And we'll see how God used those times that didn't make sense...to build our faith.
 - We will find that his **intentions** were as **good** as they **seemed**...
 - o That his promises were as true as we'd hoped. And it will all make sense.
